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Review of *Restoring Free Speech and Liberty on Campus*

Drawing on personal experiences as well research by the author, here is the recent work on free speech and civil liberty that have sprung upon America's campuses following the wave of so-called progressive reforms instituted in the 1980s and the 1990s. The most important reforms include speech codes, broad anti-harassment codes, orientation programs dedicated to promoting an ideology of sensitivity and new procedures and pressure of the adjudication of students and faculty misconduct. This book tells the story of how and why this turn of events took place. But it goes a step further than previous literature. Although this book stresses the threats to academic and intellectual freedom posed by speech codes and related policies, freedom is also threatened by other sources, especially in the post-September 11 world. Terrorism and the reaction to it have also brought about new threats to academic and intellectual freedom. Terrorism is a threat, of course, as such groups as al Qaeda are bent on destroying the very fabric of liberal freedom in the world. The book is a progressive work of scholarship and an important contribution to the never-ending real world struggles to maintain free speech on campus. The book should be read by anyone interested in the status of

higher education, the fate of constitutional citizenship, the politics of civil liberty and large questions dealing with the relationship between law and politics.
